



FORBES ROBINSON:

FORBES ROBINSON was born in Cheshire and comes from a musical family. He trained as a school-teacher at St. Paul's College, Cheltenham, and at Loughborough where he gained an Honours Diploma in Physical Education.

He studied singing in Leicester and Manchester, and then in 1952 won a national singing contest which gave him twelve months training at La Scala, Milan—the first Englishman to be admitted to the Voice School in that theatre. He joined the company at the Royal Opera House making his debut in 1954.

A very versatile artist, he has sung many diverse roles; has appeared at Festivals at Aldeburgh, Edinburgh and Lucerne; has sung in Buenos Aires, Munich and Zurich, and last year was awarded the Opera Medal by the Harriot Cohen International Music Awards.

He is a frequent broadcaster and has appeared in four operas on TV.

GEORGE H. SUTCLIFFE:

George Sutcliffe is a native of Gateshead where he sang as a chorister in St. Columba's Church and studied piano with Thomas Wilkinson. He later studied organ and composition with Dr. J. E. Hutchinson and Sir Edward Bairstow.

He won the Priestman Trophy for Organ Solo at the North of England Musical Tournament in 1931, and in 1936 gained his F.R.C.O. diploma with which he won the Turpin Prize. He has held appointments as Organist and Choirmaster at Gateshead and Gosforth, and since 1947 has held this post at Jesmond Parish Church.

He is official accompanist to the North of England Musical Tournament, and is well known throughout the North of England particularly for his organ recitals.

He made his London debut in 'Nabucco' with Harvey Allen and Amy Shuard, and, in the following year, sang the tenor lead in a London performance of the Verdi 'Requiem'. Since returning to the North East, he has sung extensively in Oratorio and Opera, both with the Palatine Opera Group, and the Durham County Opera, his favourite roles being "Cavaradosi" in 'Tosca', "Alfredo" in 'La Traviata' and "Don Jose" in Carmen. Although trained along classical lines, his musical interests are wide and varied. He has performed in Musicals with many local societies. He has recorded for Decca on two occasions, and his record 'Blaydon Races' gained him a national reputation as a singer of 'Geordie' songs, in that he helped educate London audiences into understanding and pronunciation of.... English as she is spoken twixt Tyne and Tees!

THE WEARSIDE BARBERSHOP HARMONY CLUB.

Since it's formation in 1974, the club has enjoyed considerable success. In 1975, the Club's 14 strong chorus....'The Roker Paers of Harmony'.... competed at the British Association of Barbershop Singer Convention and were placed seventh. In subsequent competitions, the Club was placed 3rd in 1976,1977 and 1981; 2nd in 1978 and 1980; won the Northern Area Championship in 1981 and 1982; and finally became the National Champion Barbershop Chorus in April 1982.

Enthusiasm and teamwork have led to the Club's success, but credit for the driving force goes to Keith Murray(Chorus Director since 1974); ably assisted by his Deputy Chorus Director, Peter Jones; the Club's Music Committee; and Choreographer, Doreen Carr, who have all worked untiringly to improve the standards of both the sound

and appearance og the Chorus.

The Chorus, which is featured on two L.P. records and a cassette, have broadcast on local, national and overseas radio, and have appeared on 8.8.C. Television.

The members enjoy their hobby and are proud to be known as a happy Chorus, both on and off the stage; having performed at over 200 functions ranging from local Church Halls, to Theatres throughout the North of England, and even at the 2500 seating capacity Wembley Conference Centre. It must be said, however, that the 'Peers' are especially proud to be the first ever Barbershop Chorus to perform in Scotland.

Within the Chorus, there are several quartet groups who perform at concerts and take part in competitions in their own right. All the quartet groups namely.... "Old Gold"... "C-Siders"... "4th of July"... "Metro-4"... have competed nationally, and one of the Club's former quartets, namely the "Five Bridge Four" gained top honours by becoming the National Barbershop Quartet Champions, at Brighton in 1975.

LYONS MALE VOICE CHOIR NEWS.

Since our last Annual Concert, Lyons Male Voice Choir has enjoyed another successful year of hard work and enjoyable singing. We have again increased our membership over the year, our present total number of choristers being 74, although things like work, illness, family commitments etc; mean that a full turn out of members at any function is rarely achieved.

We are very proud of the fact that the Choir won the Male Voice Choir 'A'Section at the prestigious Blackpool Musical Festival in October 1982. 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

"Thomas Allen is the best English baritone this century".

So wrote the Guardian newspaper recently, and since that date Thomas Allen has indeed established himself as one of the leading lyric baritones of the day, with a repertoire that extends from Rameau, Monteverdi and Purcell to the music of the present day.

He is particularly associated with the operas of Mozart, and has received international acclaim for his performances as Count Almaviva, Don Giovanni and Papageno, most notably with Colin Davis, Riccardo Muti, Bernard Haitink and the late Karl Böhm.

In 1982 he returned to Glyndebourne for another series of performances of Don Giovanni, a role he first sang there in 1977 with considerable success.

His Italian debut was as Count Almaviva under Riccardo Muti in Florence in 1979 and his New York Metropolitan debut as Papageno in November 1981.

But perhaps his most noted interpretation is as Billy Budd in Benjamin Britten's opera, a role he has sung frequently with the Welsh National Opera and also at Covent Garden.

Why do we love to sing?

The other night I sat down to watch Colin Jones attempt to win a World Boxing Title, then, as I expected his supports from the Welsh Valleys burst forth in song. As I listened my mind wandered back to the roots of this ancient Celtic People, and their love of song. From there my thoughts turned to the chanting of football crowds, the ooohs and aaars of a bull-fight in Spain, and from there to the rhythmic crunch of army boots upon the drill square, and the changes of tempo based upon my own army service experience. The strident voices of NCO's issuing commands, the beat of drum and blast of bugle, our Anglo Saxon ancestors with their battle cry of OUT, OUT, OUT, or the Viking blood in our veins with its song to ODIN and THOR, the rattle of Claymore and the savage whooping of the clans in full battle cry, with their Blue Bonnets over the Border.

These things are the base roots from which our songs have sprung. Wagner was inspired by his preoccupation with Norsk Mythology, 'Hearts of Oak' thrusts us back to our Iron Men in Wooden Ships ancestry, 'Jerusalem' revives the battles of the industrial revolution and so on. The music of Elgar cannot fail to lift an Englishman and raise his spirits, the challenge is always heightened in any conflict when the drum rolls and the human voice is added to the effect. The last war produced a whole flood of great and inspiring songs; Vera Lynn has gone down in history and in a thousand years from now, people learning history will hear her voice. The music of these Islands on the edge of the world rings with sentiment, pathos, joy, and sorrow. In it is the embodiment of all of our hopes, with its history stretching back to and beyond the Celts.

To sing is as natural to us as breathing, it goes back to the Warrior Shepherd Celt with his bagpipes, sitting there upon some wine red moor improving the quality of his rough life with music. I can imagine the bawdy songs of the Saxons in their Mead Halls in winter, smoke eddying around the rough thatched roof, boar hounds lying upon the rush strewn floor casting a bleary eye at the disturbers of their slumber, whilst the singer went on quite oblivious of his critics. Blondell singing his heart out around the castles of Europe searching for his beloved Coeur-de-Lion. It's all there, bred in the bone, the excitement, the tension, the expectation, is all in the songs of our people of the past, present, and future.

To sing in my choir surrounded by the sounds issuing from all around me must feel no different than to stand in the lines of the Saxons and sing OUT, OUT, OUT, or to stand on the terraces of a football ground and chant HA-WAY THE LADS, HA-WAY THE LADS. It is all part of that indefinable substance within us. The gathering together, the comradeship, the unity, we have 'Packed Up Our Troubles In Our Kit Bags', seen 'Blue Birds Over The White Cliffs of Dover', tried to 'Fight The Good Fight with All of Our Might', since the beginning of time.

In times of trouble it lifts the spirits if you sing. The one significant feature of the current Miners' Strike is that I have never once heard them sing, their leaders must therefore lack that one essential ingredient of tolerance. If they had sang their way through this strike they could have maybe won, but intolerance although not always fully understood is easily detected by the nation, and any goodwill that might be forthcoming is held back.

At the time of publication of Life With The Lyons we shall be hosts to Thomas Allen. We are small fry compared to a singer of his standing, but being a local man who served his apprenticeship in and around this very area, I am sure he will be looking forward to visiting his family home in Seaham. The members of the Lyons Male Voice Choir are all looking forward to his visit. We know how good he is from his TV appearances and radio work, and his coming to Hetton to sing for all of us is indeed a treat. What more can I say

than 'Welcome Home' Thomas, you are amongst friends and admirers. Eager and awaiting your songs.
